# **ACT and SAT**

## Which test(s) should I take?

- Consult <u>www.collegeboard.com</u> or the college's website to determine which test(s) it requires or recommends.
- Colleges will accept either the ACT or SAT equally. It is a good idea to take both tests (in case you do better on one than the other), especially if you aren't happy with the scores from your first test.
- Students should register for the optional Essay/Writing test unless they know it is not required or recommended by the colleges they are considering. See the following websites for lists of colleges that require or recommend this test:

# Should I take any SAT Subject Tests?

- Some of the very selective schools require or recommend that students also take 2 or 3 SAT Subject Tests. (Up to three SAT Subject Tests may be taken on one test day, but the SAT and SAT Subject Tests must be taken on separate test days.)

- University of California schools no longer require the Subject tests. However, their policy states that "some UC campuses recommend that students vying for slots in competitive majors take the tests to demonstrate subject proficiency." ## When should I take the test(s)?

- You should take the SAT and/or ACT in the spring or summer of your junior year. (Students at any age are allowed to take the tests, but you're most likely to get your best scores at the end of your junior year. However, some students find it useful to take the test earlier so they can get more familiar with it before the end of junior year.)
- SAT Subject Tests should also be taken in the spring/summer of the junior year (or whenever the student completes the course in that subject area).

## How do I register for the test(s)?

- Register online (SAT <u>collegereadiness.collegeboard.org/sat</u>; ACT <u>www.actstudent.org</u>)
- The deadlines listed on back mean that your registration must be submitted online on or before the date indicated. (The most convenient test centers fill up quickly, and late applicants are assigned to less convenient sites, so register early.)

# How can I get a fee waiver for the test(s)?

Sections: Individual tests in English Literature, History (U.S. or World), Language (Chinese, French, Hebrew, German, Italian, Japanese, Korean, Latin, Spanish or German), Math (Level 1 or Level 2), and Science (Biology-

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Ecological\*, Biology-Molecular\*, Chemistry or Physics)

Scoring: 200 - 800 for each test

Total Time: 1 hour each

<sup>\*</sup>Biology-E "leans more toward biological communities, populations, and energy flow" while Biology-M is "geared toward biochemistry, cellular structure and processes, such as respiration and photosynthesis." If you're more of a science-oriented student, you'll probably be better off with Biology-M. If you're more into subjects like history and English, Biology-E might be a better choice.
